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## THE COMMISSION'S MANDATE

The Manitoba Law Reform Commission is an independent law reform agency established by *The Law Reform Commission Act*. The Commission's duties are to inquire into and consider any matter relating to law in Manitoba with a view to making recommendations for the improvement, modernization and reform of law, including:

- the removal of provisions of the law that are outdated or inconsistent;
- the maintenance and improvement of the administration of justice;
- the review of judicial and quasi-judicial procedures under any Act;
- the development of new approaches to, and new concepts of, law in keeping with and responsive to the changing needs of society and of individual members of society; and
- any subject referred to it by the Minister.

## MANDAT DE LA COMMISSION

# PART I

## INTRODUCTION

The Manitoba Law Reform Commission is pleased to present its annual report for 2019-2020.

The Commission published three final reports and three consultation reports in 2019-2020. The first final report, entitled “Creating Efficiencies in the Law: *The Expropriation Act* of Manitoba” (Report #137) was published on June 11, 2019. The second final report, “Creating Efficiencies in the Law: *The Beneficiary Designation Act (Retirement, Savings and Other Plans)*” was published on September 24, 2019. The third final report, “Reform of *The Wills Act, The Law of Property Act, and The Beneficiary Designation Act, Revisited*” was published on March 27, 2020.

The Commission is in the final stages of its two ongoing projects: (i) a review of s. 64 of *The Manitoba Evidence Act* and the physical presence requirement in relation to taking affidavit evidence and (ii) a review and consideration of unclaimed property. Final reports on both projects are scheduled to be released in 2020.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Commission was delayed in selecting its projects for the 2020-2021 year. However, given the thought-provoking and relevant proposals received by the Commission, there is no doubt that the Commission’s upcoming projects will lead to the improvement and modernization of Manitoba’s laws.

In keeping with its mandate, the Commission strives to make recommendations that improve, clarify and update the laws of Manitoba. The Commission continues to find new ways to engage with the public and legal community, to not only consult on areas of law reform and ensure that its recommendations are practical and sensible, but also to provide public legal education on selected topics.

For a law reform agency of its size, the Commission maximizes its resources to produce meaningful publications every year and contribute to the conversation surrounding important issues affecting Manitobans.

## PART II

### THE YEAR IN REVIEW April 1, 2019 to March 31, 2020

#### 1. FINAL REPORTS ISSUED

##### A. Creating Efficiencies in the Law: *The Expropriation Act of Manitoba* (Report #137)

On June 11, 2019, the Commission released its 137<sup>th</sup> Final Report, "*The Expropriation Act of Manitoba*". This report is part of the Commission's ongoing series titled "Creating Efficiencies in the Law" which proposes relatively straightforward legislative solutions in discrete projects.

*The Expropriation Act* sets out the process that must be followed by any expropriating authority when land is taken from its owner for public use and prescribes how the owner should be compensated. *The Land Acquisition Act* establishes the Land Value Appraisal Commission, which is the administrative body that hears applications and determines due compensation in respect of land acquisition, including expropriation. Additionally, *The Expropriation Act* provides compensation to owners for "injurious affection", which occurs when damages are sustained by an owner where only part of the land is taken, or where the owner sustains damages to their land as a result of an expropriation even where no land is taken.

In this report, the Commission makes a number of recommendations to amend the Act, the most significant being the removal of restrictive wording that prevents landowners from making claims. This language contained in Manitoba's statute is inconsistent with expropriation legislation in other Canadian jurisdictions and may hinder the ability of a land owner to claim due compensation in certain circumstances.

The Commission released a Consultation Report in January 2018 and received input from practitioners with expertise in the area of expropriation prior to the publication of the Final Report. The report is limited to reviewing the particular aspects of *The Expropriation Act* which were identified by legal practitioners as problematic and is not a largescale review of the statute.

**B. Creating Efficiencies in the Law: *The Beneficiary Designation Act (Retirement, Savings and Other Plans)* (Final Report #138)**

On September 24, 2019, the Commission released its 138<sup>th</sup> Final Report, titled “*The Beneficiary Designation Act (Retirement, Savings and Other Plans)*”. This report is also part of the Commission’s ongoing “Creating Efficiencies in the Law” series.

*The Beneficiary Designation Act (Retirement, Savings and Other Plans)* was enacted pursuant to the Commission’s Final Report #73, “Statutory Designations and *The Retirement Plan Beneficiaries Act*” published in 1990. The purpose of the Act is to provide for the creation of beneficiary designations under insurance and pension benefits legislation.

This report addresses the need for reform in three main areas: (1) the continuation of beneficiary designations where plans are renewed, replaced, or converted; (2) making, changing or revoking beneficiary designations; and (3) the effect of marriage, divorce and common-law relationships on designations. The report also considers other areas of reform, namely irrevocable beneficiary designations, multiple beneficiaries, trusteeship, prescribing plans, beneficiary pre-deceasing a plan participant; and plan benefits and claims from creditors.

In the final report, the Commission makes eight recommendations to amend and update *The Beneficiary Designation Act* to help Manitobans carry out their intentions when it comes to making beneficiary designations. The most significant recommendation is proposed amendments to *The Mental Health Act*, *The Vulnerable Persons Living with a Mental Disability Act* and *The Powers of Attorney Act* that would expressly allow a substitute decision maker to re-designate a beneficiary to which *The Beneficiary Designation Act* applies.

The Commission considered a number of issues, the most significant of which is whether there is a gap in the law such that a beneficiary designation will not automatically roll over in certain circumstances, as when an insurance policy or investment plan is replaced or converted. Requiring the owner of or participant in a plan or policy to redesignate a beneficiary in such situations can prove particularly problematic when the owner or participant has become mentally incompetent since originally naming someone as his or her beneficiary and where decisions regarding the management of his or her affairs are being made by a substitute decision maker.

The Commission released its consultation report titled *The Beneficiary Designation Act (Retirement, Savings and Other Plans)* on April 10, 2018 and received feedback from the profession prior to forming its recommendations.



**C. "Reform of *The Wills Act*, *The Law of Property Act*, and *The Beneficiary Designation Act*, Revisited" (Final Report #139)**

The Commission released its 139<sup>th</sup> Final Report, "Reform of *The Wills Act*, *The Law of Property Act*, and *The Beneficiary Designation Act*, Revisited" on March 27, 2020. In this report, the Commission revisits the recommendations for amending *The Wills Act* and related legislation first contained in its Final Report #108 titled "Wills and Succession Legislation" published in 2003. None of the recommendations contained in Report #108 have been implemented in the 17 years since it was released.

Recommendations for significant reform reiterated in this report from the prior report include reducing the age by which a person can make a valid will from 18 to 16 years and introducing a definition of an electronic will into the legislation. Other recommendations contained in Report #108 have been reversed either due to advancements in the case law in a given area, recent trends in legislative reform in other jurisdictions or based on feedback received during consultations with the legal community. Finally, this report contains a number of new recommendations not contained in Report #108, including amendments to the Court of Queen's Bench Rules to enable the court to make, alter, or revoke a will for a person lacking testamentary mental capacity.

The Commission released a consultation paper titled "*The Wills Act*, Revisited" on September 17, 2019 and received feedback from legal practitioners on the provision recommendations and issues for discussion contained in that report. The feedback received related not only to the issues identified in the consultation paper but also pointed to other possible deficiencies in the current law.

**2. CURRENT PROJECTS**

**A. Electronic Witnessing of Affidavit Evidence**

Pursuant to *The Manitoba Evidence Act*, a number of court documents require the administration of an oath, affirmation or statutory declaration. These documents must be executed in accordance with statutory requirements including the requirement that the oath, affirmation or statutory declaration must be taken in the presence of the person qualified to administer it. This *presence* requirement has long been interpreted to require that both persons must be in each other's *physical* presence. The Commission is studying whether the statutory requirement that oaths, affirmations and statutory declarations must be taken in the presence of the person authorized to take them unduly burdens a litigant residing in a remote or northern community in Manitoba. The Commission is also considering whether changes to *The Manitoba Evidence Act* could eliminate that burden while still maintaining the protections currently afforded under the Act.

The Commission received a project grant from the Manitoba Law Foundation (Foundation) for this project, as the project fit with the Foundation’s goal to fund projects that address access to justice for remote and Northern communities. The special project funding enabled the Commission to retain lawyer Kobra Rahimi on a part-time basis from July 2019 to April 2020.

Since this project was commenced, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Province of Manitoba enacted an Order re Temporary Suspension of In-Person Commissioning and Witnessing Provisions under *The Emergency Measures Act*<sup>1</sup> [the “Emergency Order”]. Among other things, the Emergency Order temporarily suspends the requirement set out in *The Manitoba Evidence Act* that oaths, affirmations and statutory declarations must be taken “in the presence of a[n authorized] person”.<sup>2</sup> This amendment is temporary at this time and is currently set to expire on October 1, 2020. The Commission’s main consideration is whether, based on the research conducted and consultation feedback received, the removal of the presence requirement and allowance of video-conferencing technology in the taking of oaths, affirmations and declarations should be made permanent.

The Commission has engaged in an extensive consultation process which includes consultations with legal practitioners and community members in Northern communities. A consultation paper was released on January 8, 2020 titled “Bridging the Gap for Remote Communities: Electronic Witnessing of Affidavit Evidence”. The Commission intends to release its final report containing formal recommendations in 2020.

## **B. Unclaimed and Vested Personal Property**

In Manitoba, both escheats (which refers to the property of a person who dies without a will and has no known heirs) and unclaimed property vest in the Crown. The Commission has learned that the process for claiming escheated or unclaimed property is cumbersome for the government to administer and impractical for individuals seeking to claim the property. Other jurisdictions, such as British Columbia, Alberta, Quebec, Ontario, and New Brunswick have introduced legislative changes to modernize and improve legislation related to property that vests in the Crown with a number of these jurisdictions having fully operational administrative systems in place.

The Commission’s project examines reforms in other jurisdictions and consider whether similar reforms should be adopted in Manitoba.

The Commission released a consultation paper titled “Abandoned Accounts and Missing Money: Establishing a Process for Unclaimed Intangible Personal Property” on October 24, 2019. It has engaged in consultations and received valuable feedback from other Canadian jurisdictions that

have implemented unclaimed property administration systems. The Commission intends to release a final report containing recommendations in 2020.

### **3. FUTURE PROJECTS**

The Commission follows a formal procedure for selecting topics that are appropriate for law reform projects based on a set of project selection criteria and the Commission's mandate to inquire into and consider any matter relating to law in Manitoba with a view to making recommendations for the improvement, modernization and reform of law. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Commission has been delayed in selecting all of its projects for the 2020-2021 year and will be doing so in July 2020. The Commission does, however, have several ongoing projects it intends to continue in this fiscal year.

#### **A. Administrative Tribunals Legislation**

This project was originally considered by the Commission in 2013, with a proposed project on the enactment of a provincial law to govern the procedural rights of individuals in tribunal proceedings. The Commission put the project on hold for a number of years, but has now decided to revisit the issue in light of recent legislative initiatives in other Canadian jurisdictions in the area of administrative justice reform. The Commission expects this project to begin in 2020 and has engaged a legal expert in the area of administrative law to assist it with this project.

#### **B. Creating Efficiencies in the Law**

The Commission will continue to address relatively straightforward legislative solutions in discrete projects in its series on *Creating Efficiencies in the Law*. In its consultations with the legal profession and other organizations and members of the public, the list of projects will be added to in the future.

The Commission welcomes comments and suggestions with respect to these subject areas and any other potential law reform projects.

#### 4. IMPACT OF COMMISSION REPORTS

Three recently introduced bills have either incorporated the Commission's recommendations or have addressed concerns identified in Commission reports. *Bill 2: The Municipal Amendment Act (Strengthening Codes of Conduct for Council Members)* addresses an issue identified in Final Report #132, "Modernizing *The Municipal Council Conflict of Interest Act: Accountability, Enforcement & Oversight*" regarding codes of conduct for municipal councilors. *Bill 20: The Courts Modernization Act (Various Acts Amended)* implements some of the Commission's recommendations contained in Final Report #134, "Improving the Small Claims System in Manitoba" regarding increasing the monetary limit for small claims and creating a default judgment process. Finally, *Bill 226: The Presumption of Death and Declaration of Absence Act and Amendments to the Insurance Act* implements some of the Commission's recommendations from Final Report #131, "Improving Manitoba's *Presumption of Death Act*".

The Commission continues to urge the Minister of Justice to implement the outstanding recommendations of the Commission, many of which would lead to efficiencies in the administration of justice. The Commission's reports undergo a consultation process before final reports are released, so that legal practitioners and interested individuals and groups have the opportunity to provide feedback on the recommendations contained therein. This process ensures the recommendations are meaningful, practical and their implementation would improve the laws of Manitoba. In particular, the Commission emphasizes the need to reform *The Limitation of Actions Act*, and highlights its Final Report #123, *Limitations*, which has yet to be implemented.

The Commission has developed a system for tracking the impact of past Commission reports. The results of this process demonstrate that Commission reports are impacting the law in a variety of ways rather than simply through legislative amendments. The Commission's publications have been the subject of commentary in legal journals, print and electronic media and court and tribunal judgments. To date, the Commission has been cited in over one hundred judgments, including the Supreme Court of Canada's judgments in *A.C. v. Manitoba (Director of Child and Family Services)*, [2009] 2 S.C.R. 181; *Manitoba Métis Federation Inc. v. Canada (Attorney General)*, [2013] 1 S.C.R. 623; *Olson Dominion Construction Ltd. v. Structal Heavy Steel*, [2015] 3 S.C.R. 127. Most recently, the Commission's report #130 "Manitoba's Environmental Assessment and Licensing Regime Under *The Environment Act*" was referenced by the Manitoba Court of Appeal in *Samborski Environmental Ltd. v. The Government of Manitoba et al*, 2020 MBCA 63 in its decision released in 2020.

## PART III

### ADMINISTRATION

#### 1. THE COMMISSIONERS

The Manitoba Law Reform Commission is composed of five to seven members appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council. Section 3 of *The Law Reform Commission Act* requires that the Commission's membership include a judge of the Court of Queen's Bench; a full-time member of the Faculty of Law, University of Manitoba; a lawyer entitled to practice in Manitoba and not in the employ of the government; and a non-lawyer. The current members of the Commission and their terms of office are as follows:

Currently, the Commission does not include a judge of the Court of Queen's Bench as Commissioner Hon. Lori Spivak was appointed to the Manitoba Court of Appeal in 2019. As she was no longer a sitting judge of the Court of Queen's Bench, Justice Spivak was no longer able to sit as a Commissioner of the Manitoba Law Reform Commission. The Commission is currently awaiting the appointment of a replacement.

The Commission held seven regular meetings during the 2019-2020 fiscal year.

## **2. STAFF**

Elizabeth McCandless served as the Commission's director and legal counsel until October 2019 and Kristal Bayes-McDonald took over the position at that time. Additionally, the Commission retained Kobra Rahimi as legal counsel in July 2019 and she completed her contract with the Commission at the end of the fiscal year. Linda Manson served as the Commission's administrator.

## **3. FINANCE**

The Manitoba Law Foundation provided an annual core grant of \$115,000 to the Commission for the 2019-2020 fiscal year in addition to a project-specific grant for the electronic witnessing project of \$14,000<sup>3</sup> for a total of \$129,000. Manitoba Justice continues to provide a total grant of \$100,000 consisting of in-kind services valued at \$15,000 and a monetary grant of \$85,000.

The Commission wishes to thank both Manitoba Justice and the Manitoba Law Foundation for their continued support of its work.

## **4. EXTERNAL RELATIONS AND ACTIVITIES**

In 2019-2020, the Commission increased its accessibility and visibility within the community through public legal education and consultation.

The Commission is well-situated to provide educational opportunities for law students. For the fifth year, the Commission provided a student internship program with the Faculty of Law at the University of Manitoba. Through the internship, law students gained practical skills by working at the Commission office one day per week on law reform matters under the supervision of Commission staff while earning credit toward their law degree. In 2019-2020, the Commission saw one student, Jarrod Sundmark, successfully complete the internship program. The Commission also engaged in a project with three second and third-year law students through the Faculty's Pro Bono Students Canada program. Commission staff created a project that was tailored to suit the educational needs of the students and provided supervision and feedback along the way. Finally, the Commission has worked in partnership with the University of Manitoba Faculty of Law to establish a new intensive internship program which will see one upper year student placed with the Commission on a part-time basis for the 2020-2021 school year and be fully immersed in the workings of the Law Reform Commission for credit toward their law degree. This 12 credit internship will replace the former 3 hour internship program and will commence in September 2020.

The Commission recognizes the importance of community outreach in maintaining the relevance and quality of law reform initiatives while contributing to legal education in Manitoba. In 2019-2020, the Commission participated in a number of presentations to further legal education and professional development in Winnipeg. Additionally, in January and February 2020, the Commission staff travelled to both the Pas and Thompson, Manitoba to consult with the legal profession and community members on its electronic witnessing project.

On October 17<sup>th</sup>, 2019, the Commission planned and facilitated a roundtable discussion with the membership of the Wills, Estates and Succession Section of the Manitoba Bar Association. On January 24, 2020, the Commission conducted a seminar at the Manitoba Bar Association's 2020 Mid-Winter Conference on selected law reform topics. The Commission has a number of seminars planned with the legal profession in the upcoming year and continues to seek out opportunities to engage with members of the profession and the public on law reform initiatives, including consultation events outside of Winnipeg.

The Commission is a member of the Federation of Law Reform Agencies of Canada (FOLRAC) and the Commonwealth Association of Law Reform Agencies. Commission staff share ideas and learn from the experience of other FOLRAC members through regular teleconferences.

Legal counsel Kristal Bayes-McDonald and former Commissioner Hon. Gerald Jewers act as the Commission's representatives with the Access to Justice Stakeholders Committee, created by the Law Society of Manitoba in 2011. Representatives of government, the courts, the practicing bar and legal aid bodies are also included in the Committee. The purpose of the Committee is to share ideas, information and best practices and to coordinate efforts in the area of access to justice.

In early 2019, the Commission entered the world of social media by creating a Twitter account (@MBLawReform). This allows the Commission to stay engaged in law reform matters across Canada and provides followers real-time updates on the Commission's activities and publications.

### **CONCLUSION**

The Commission again wishes to express its gratitude to the Manitoba Law Foundation and Manitoba Justice for their continued support.
